Mount Elbrus in Russia (5,642 metres/18,510ft) is the highest mountain in Europe and is part of the Caucasus mountain range. Europe borders onto the Arctic Ocean in the north, the Atlantic Ocean in the west and the Mediterranean Sea in the south. The Danube is the most important commercial waterway in Europe. Vatican City is the smallest country not only in Europe, but also in the world. The city state, an enclave within Italy, is the smallest country both by population and by size.
